Meet Our ESOL Students & Program

Daytime ESOL

The daytime ESOL class is going well, with some sixteen and growing members enrolled. Students are working hard on their lessons and are dedicated to improving their English skills. We use a variety of resources to improve writing skills, vocabulary, reading and comprehension, pronunciation, and listening skills.

Our classes usually begin with a writing prompt with the students doing their best to answer the prompt in writing. Their writing is checked for grammar, spelling, and punctuation and the student reads their answer aloud. We have a daily reading activity designed for our ESOL students. These articles are on health, safety, finance, and family life where students are first introduced to the vocabulary.

We also learn about current events while reading "News for You," a newspaper published especially for students. Our students also enjoy learning new words, and how to spell them, with crossword puzzles. Using different types of learning activities helps keep students engaged. Many times, teaching a new word may look like a game of charades. Acting out words makes learning more fun!

While a few from last year have returned, most of our ESOL students this year are beginning English learners. Just for example, Evelia Mote and Esmeralda "Esme" Contteras are very dedicated and loyal students. Esme brings her four-year-old son, Alex, to learn in our preschool. Nighttime ESOL

The enrollment in the Tuesday evening ESOL class continues to grow, and at last count exceeded some fifteen. Many of them bring their children to attend our nighttime preschool classes or receive homework assistance for their older children. The background of our evening class varies, requiring flexibility on the part of our instructor, Ms. Sandra Annotti.

(Of course, the objective of ESOL classes is to improve the comprehension and use of a student's English, regardless of his or her native language.) Leonardo and Edison are from Brazil and speak Portuguese. They have an extensive vocabulary and have added greatly to class discussions with their eager participation and willingness to share their culture. Lupe Juarez, originally from Mexico, has made progress in comprehension, and is always willing to assist others. Daniel has improved his writing skills, and now readily responds in class. Mireya Maguey has improved in comprehension and writing. Lourdes Maguey has made significant improvement in comprehension and participation.

We greatly appreciate the services of our long time ESOL teacher, Sandra Annotti.

As our daytime and nighttime ESOL students make progress and gain confidence in their comprehension and use of English, they ultimately have to decide whether they want to continue their education by enrolling in our GED program, as has occurred in past years. (Lupe Juarez in this year's evening class has already improved her Math by attending our Monday night GED Math class for a while.) Some of our students already have advanced degrees from their native countries and come to our ESOL class to improve their English.



Daytime Preschool

Our families love their children and want to do what they can to help them grow up to be a success in school and beyond. However, they may not fully understand how quickly their child's brains grow and how important it is to provide a variety of stimuli to encourage healthy growth - through reading, repetition, and play. Early and consistent attention will result in a better chance to learn, grow, compete and succeed in school and throughout life. That is the reason for efforts such as the Academy's preschool program and life skills classes and our joining the Charter schools' READ20 initiative (which, from its beginning, the Academy has espoused as a vital component of family literacy). The Academy, through the Family Literacy Coalition, looks forward to providing community wide awareness of the importance of these needs evidenced in the video "No Small Matter." This is all about the second generation and our efforts to decrease the cycle of poverty and increase the level of literacy.

Giggles, smiles, playing and hugs all are part of our day along with so much more. These are some of the precious moments we experience each day in the childcare program offered by the Family Literacy Academy.

The childcare program is to provide a safe, fun, and educational environment to the children of the parents who are attending the academy, to work towards attaining their GED or improving their English in the ESOL program. The goal is to provide literacy rich curriculum.

Throughout the morning, the teachers greet each child and encourage them to play in the various centers. These centers include, housekeeping, blocks and trucks, puzzles, various manipulatives, art, books, and puppets, and recently added, the grocery store. The teachers find opportunities to work with the students on developmental skills that are appropriate for each age and take every opportunity to read to the children.

Along with developmental skills, the three-and four-year-old children work on age-appropriate academic skills in a small group setting. Other activities include snack time, outdoor play, and whole group reading time. When the parents pick up their children, they may check out classroom books, donated by United Way, to read with their child at home and we also send books home that are theirs to keep.

It would be so easy to tell you about the successes of each of the students we are privileged to teach. However, for this article, we will highlight two.

First, we would like to introduce you to Elizabeth. She has attended our program for 2 years. Due to medical issues, she has had some delays in her early development. The teachers worked with the recommendations given by her doctors and parents. This year, she is no longer dealing with some of the medical issues, so we are now collaborating with medical personnel to encourage success with her early developmental skills. Speech and make believe are two of those skills. She is making progress in both; but we are so pleased to see her growing interest for playing in the housekeeping center and taking care of the baby dolls. She loves to walk them in the stroller. We are excited to see how she will continue to progress this year.









Preschool (cont.)

Alex is another one of our students. Alex walks in each day with a smile on his face and wants to find his friends and start his day. He is one of our older students and he enjoys helping the younger ones. For part of the morning, he works in the three- and four-year-old program. He is so excited to come into class and find out what we will be doing that day. He is eager to listen to and talk about the stories we read, and he loves to work on our daily skills and projects. He is a joy to have in our program. Working with our students and their families is a privilege and we are so thankful that we can provide this gift of childcare so that the parents can work towards building a better future for their family.

Our evening children's program provides much the same learning opportunity, with fully functioning teachers (headed by Ann Oriend, experienced in preschool work) for preschool students but adds the services of experienced elementary teacher Jeff Olson to provide homework assistance and appropriate-aged activities to the school age students of our night time GED students.

















Parenting & Life Skills Classes

Parenting classes are scheduled throughout each month. These classes focus on different topics to help encourage a safe and positive experience in raising their children.

Examples of some of the classes are the importance of reading with their child, how to choose age-appropriate books, seatbelt safety and first aid. These discussions may lead to the use of guest speakers. This is also an opportunity for the parents to share their concerns and successes with raising their child and create meaningful relationships and provide support and encouragement with the other parents in the program.

So often, parents, especially single parents, feel that they are alone in dealing with issues such as self-esteem, stress and special needs and identifying helpful community resources.

THE IMPORTANCE OF POLK STATE COLLEGE TO THE ACADEMY AND THE COMMUNITY

Polk State College adds \$215.5 million to county economy Dr. Angela Garcia Falconetti Guest Columnist

The transformative impact Polk State College has on the lives of students is witnessed on campus each day, and the value graduates add to the local workforce is evident across the community with approximately 70% remaining in Polk County. A recent study reaffirms the value of Polk State, finding that the College's credit programs add \$215.5 million in total income to the Polk County economy each year.

Polk State commissioned this study by Emsi Burning Glass using Fiscal Year 2020-2021 data for degree-seeking students to establish a baseline as it updates its strategic plan and prepares for significant growth in student enrollment, programs, and geographic footprint. Polk State's credit programs include 24 associate degrees and six baccalaureate degrees.

















THE IMPORTANCE OF POLK STATE COLLEGE TO THE ACADEMY AND THE COMMUNITY (cont.)

Fifty-five percent of this impact - or \$118.5 million - is a direct result of the increased earnings students and alumni receive because of their Polk State education and training. For every \$1 a student invests in Polk State, they receive a cumulative value of \$5 in higher future earnings. This not only benefits them, but also their families, local businesses, and the overall economic development of the region. To put it into perspective, this is an economic boost similar to hosting the World Series - 20 times.

This comes as no surprise to Polk State, which is on the cusp of significant growth alongside greater Polk County. Polk remains one of the fastest growing areas in the nation with an estimated 45 people moving to the County daily, and quality higher education and workforce training remain critical to ensuring an exceptional quality of life for current residents and those to come. The economic impact report was released as Polk State prepares for its largest growth period in more than a decade.

Following a historical legislative session in which Polk State was allocated \$53.1 million, the College is expanding with \$13.8 million to begin the development of the Haines City-Davenport Campus in Northeast Polk County. The new campus located along U.S. 27 in Haines City, adjacent to Advent Health Heart of Florida and the Medeplex, will bring quality higher education and workforce training closer for many residents in Polk County's fastest-growing region. Phase one of the \$51 million development will include designing, planning, and site preparation for the multi-phased project. Within a 10-mile radius of the site, there are more than 80,000 residents whose highest educational attainment is a high school diploma - or some college - but no degree. The campus will serve students and families in Haines City and Davenport, as well as a broad area of Central Florida including Clermont, Poinciana and Champion's Gate. Of Polk State's seven locations in Winter Haven, Lakeland, Bartow and Lake Wales, the closest campus for residents of Northeast Polk is approximately 30 miles roundtrip, which means this Polk State location will make quality education more accessible to thousands.

The results of the recent economic impact study affirm the return on investment for ventures such as this expansion of the college. As Polk County's largest-serving public institution of higher education, Polk State is working diligently to ensure that it will meet the needs of the rapidly expanding community.
